### The News by Brian Marsh

- \* October 15-19 marked the global <u>Week Without Violence</u>, during which the **YWCA** paired with the **MT Department of Justice** to bring a <u>panel</u> of experts together to inform the Montana public about human trafficking in the state.
- \* **Vermont** received a <u>\$1.2 million grant</u> from the U.S. Department of Justice to combat human trafficking over the next three years. A primary goal of the grant is to promote **greater collaboration** between **State Police**, **Vermont Center for Crime Victim Services**, & **Vermont Human Trafficking Task Force**.

For centuries, physicians have argued ethical the implications of Hippocratic Oath. Some follow it to the letter, insisting no harm does not include interfering in a patient's life, while others take a more interpretive approach. Questions of responsibility beyond treating a patient's physical wounds have been raised and caused enormous change in the medical community. Some realms of human rights, however, remain unaddressed by healthcare networks. Among unaddressed issues is human trafficking.

Although the effects of human trafficking often go unnoticed, they are present in all of our lives on a **daily basis**. On Wednesday, October 24, members from The HEART Initiative and <u>HAVEN</u> talked with about 40 students during a <u>Women's Center Sack Lunch Seminar</u> to discuss human trafficking in the production of <u>coffee and electronic devices</u>, **local anti-trafficking efforts**, and what human trafficking looks like closer to home, in **Montana**.

are reports that between "30-88 percent of US trafficking victims visit a health care professional at least once during their captivity," the response healthcare professionals has come under scrutiny. Are physicians responsible for recognizing signs of human trafficking and intervening in the situation?

More and more frequently in emergency rooms and waiting rooms around the nation, **trafficked children**, **teens**, **and adults** are being seen by healthcare professionals and **released back to their traffickers**. If one of your patients shows the **red flags of trafficking**, what does your oath as a doctor ask of you?

In the last five years, professional healthcare associations have created statements regarding trafficking and recommended that healthcare professionals undergo **training to recognize and handle** situations involving human trafficking.

Though the medical community is beginning to recognize the issue, they are not doing enough to help stop it. Medicine has already responsibility for training employees in realms of child, elder, and relationship abuse. However, in surveys students and professionals, respondents reported having little to no knowledge about how to identify a victim of trafficking or how to appropriately respond.

If the medical community could create an effective **training program** beginning at the student level, the **next generation of physicians and nurses** could join in the **fight to end human trafficking**.
