\* The US Department of Justice recently <u>granted \$1.5 million</u> to hospital system **Dignity Health**, which has locations in Nevada, California, and Arizona. This grant was awarded with the expressed purpose of **training professionals** how to provide "**trauma-informed care**" for survivors of sex and labor trafficking.

\* Last month, **over 200 people** attended a <u>panel-based forum in Great Falls</u> organized by the **Cascade County Human Trafficking Task Force** that helped increase awareness of human trafficking to the Montana public.

A recently founded organization, the HEAL Trafficking Network started its anti-trafficking work in 2013. HEAL works from the unique perspective that human trafficking is a public health issue. Their vision is "a world healed of human trafficking." The acronym HEAL stands for Health, Education, Advocacy, and Linkage. The organization claims interdisciplinarity, and primarily attracts members in the healthcare professions based on the way it carries out its work and its guiding principles.

Like the **Gallatin County Anti-Trafficking Task Force**, it is divided into committees that address specific issues related to trafficking. These groups include research, health systems protocol, and media. They also



that can **overlap and interact**; these issues cannot be examined or addressed separately. It is now being used to frame **social justice issues** as an attempt to avoid the **isolation** of the single-issue mindset in order to create a more **powerful** movement for social justice.

mind, how might With this in intersectionality relate to not only human trafficking survivorship but also factors that impact all of our lives? All too often survivors of human trafficking are presented as a "single voice", a "common story" to be leveraged by professionals and the media. But as intersectionality states, there are many details like gender/identity, sexuality, socioeconomic nationality, ability, status, and religion that play a role in the story of survivorship (and a role in everyone's' lives!).

The intersectionality of **different lived experiences** can be used to influence the services provided so that the individuality of a survivor is not pigeonholed by a single experience. In order to fully understand a person or an all facets issue. of identity or considered circumstance must be and unique connected. Acknowledgement of intersectionality of human trafficking with other issues of social injustice and discrimination promotes better prevention and care that is properly tailored to fit those affected.

By employing an **intersectional approach**, specific needs can be better understood, and systems of oppression, like human trafficking, can be more **readily challenged**. This is the **objective of our CLIFF Convention in March** (see Upcoming Events).
